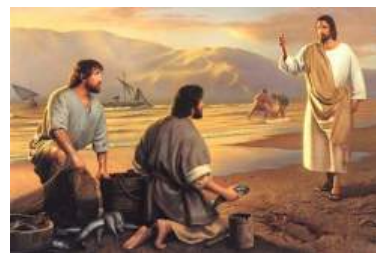

Come and See

"Sir, we would like to see Jesus." (John 12:21)

Some Gentile converts to Judaism approached Philip because they wanted to meet Jesus. They had *come* to see... While they embraced the same faith as the Jewish community, their culture and ethnicity made them "different." Jesus responded that he came to "draw everyone to myself" - including people who are different, ignored and/or marginalized.



Five hundred years later, a sixteen year old Briton named Patricius was kidnapped and enslaved by Irish raiders. The Romans believed the Irish were far worse than different - they were considered barbarians - less than human. Yet while among a culturally different and predominately pagan people, a nonreligious Patricius experienced a spiritual conversion and embraced Christianity. After his escape and return home, Patricius became a priest. He felt a strong calling to live among the Irish and share Jesus with them. Patricius returned to Ireland as Patrick - spending the rest of his life among a "different" people as he invited them to *come and see*.

Like Philip and Patrick, we are called to look beyond the labels used in our culture to separate and identify people as "different." For each person we encounter is truly a child of God. May the Spirit of God, dwelling in each of us, grace us with the vision to see ourselves and others as many parts of One Body (1Cor.12:12). Each person is differently and wonderfully made. May we celebrate our diversity and unity as we invite others to *come and see* this life-changing truth. God bless you, Deacon Joe

- Rest in God’s presence (*Contemplatio*): Notice God’s presence and be still, surrounded by God’s love.
- Choose to act (*Actio*): Trusting in God’s nearness, commit to action rooted in love.

Eucharistic Revival



The National Eucharistic Pilgrimage—coming this summer—will be the most public opportunity for us to witness our Eucharistic faith. YOU are invited to follow Jesus as he sanctifies 6,000+ miles of our country by his Eucharistic Presence on his way to the National Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis in July!

One of the four routes of this cross-country pilgrimage is named after St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, the first American-born saint to be canonized by the Catholic Church. While a Protestant, the young mother was drawn to the Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist during a Eucharistic procession and converted to Catholicism shortly thereafter. St. Elizabeth Ann went on to open the first free Catholic school for girls in America in 1810. Her work laid the foundation for what is now the parochial school system.

The Seton Route begins on May 18 with Pentecost Vigil at the tomb of Blessed Fr. Michael McGivney in New Haven, Connecticut. From there, this route will journey through our nation’s oldest diocese and across the Appalachian Mountains. Pilgrims will visit holy sites, embrace the sacraments daily, and publicly proclaim Christ’s Real Presence in the Eucharist as they accompany him on his way to the 10th National Eucharistic Congress. Stops in New Jersey and Pennsylvania are worth checking out!

Kidney Month

Kidney disease is sometimes termed a “silent disease” as there are very few signs in the early stages. In fact, approximately 90% of chronic kidney disease (CKD) patients do not know they have kidney disease until it has reached the advanced stages. Other chronic conditions such as high blood pressure and diabetes increase the risk of kidney disease; however, assessing kidney function can be done with a simple blood test.

Simple steps to protect your kidney health include:

- Seeking care immediately if you develop signs or symptoms of a urinary tract infection
- Eat a balanced diet that is limited in sodium and added sugar
- Manage your chronic conditions (including heart disease, high blood pressure and diabetes)
- Limit alcohol intake

Women's History Month



Saint Frances Xavier Cabrini, also called Mother Cabrini, was founder of the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and the first U.S. citizen to be canonized. She is known as the patron saint of immigrants.

Maria Francesca Cabrini was born on July 15, 1850, in St. Angelo Lodigiano, Lombardy, Italy. Born prematurely, Maria was small and weak as a child and remained in delicate health throughout her life. Yet she dreamed of becoming a missionary sister. Francesca attended a school run by the Daughters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Five years later she graduated cum laude, with a teaching certificate.

Having been turned down for admission to the Daughters of the Sacred Heart because of poor health, a priest invited her to teach at the House of Providence orphanage in Cadagono. As headmistress, she drew a small community of women to live a religious way of life. In 1877, she became Mother Cabrini, taking her final vows, adding Xavier (Saverio) to her name in honor of the Jesuit saint, Francis Xavier, the patron saint of missionary service. She had planned, like Francis Xavier, to be a missionary in the Far East.

In November 1880, Mother Cabrini and seven other women who had taken religious vows with her founded the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart. Its good works brought her to the attention of Giovanni Scalabrini, Bishop of Piacenza, and of Pope Leo XIII. In September 1877, seeking the pope's approval to establish missions in China, Pope Leo urged her instead to go to the United States to help Italian immigrants who were increasing in number and in great poverty. "Not to the East, but to the West" was his advice. And thus began her missionary work in the United States.

Mother Cabrini with six other sisters arrived in New York City on March 31, 1889. Despite encountering many obstacles and hardships, she finally received permission from Archbishop Michael Corrigan to found an orphanage in what is now West Park, NY, later named St. Cabrini Home.

Mother Cabrini was known, not only for her deep faith and trust in God, but also for her resourcefulness and great administrative ability. Within 35 years, she founded 67 institutions to serve the sick and poor throughout the United States. Eventually the order spread its missionary works throughout Latin America and Europe and in 1926, nine years after her death, the Missionary Sisters achieved Cabrini's original goal of becoming missionaries to China.

Mother Cabrini was naturalized as a United States citizen in 1909. Eight years later, at the age of 67, she died due to complications of dysentery at Columbus Hospital in Chicago, one of her own.

Mother Cabrini was beatified on November 13, 1938, by Pope Pius XI and canonized on July 7, 1946, by Pope Pius XII. At her canonization, an estimated 120,000 people filled Chicago's Soldier's Field for a Mass of thanksgiving. Her feast day is the anniversary of her beatification. In 1950, Pope Pius XII named Frances Xavier Cabrini as the patron saint of immigrants, recognizing her efforts on their behalf across the Americas in schools, orphanages, hospitals, and prisons.





The Fruit of Our Lenten Sacrifice

“The Eucharist ... is the sacrament par excellence of love. Christ offers himself and breaks himself for us and asks us to do likewise so that our life might become bread that feeds our brothers and sisters.”

Christ, the bread of life, fed the multitudes while on earth and today continues to nourish us spiritually through the Eucharist. This Lent, we reflected on how the Eucharist unites us with God and one another as members of the same body of Christ, and how the Lord invites us to see him in our global family.

We saw Christ in Uganda, through Adolf and Florence, who learned new farming methods, so they can provide food for their family and help their neighbors grow better crops. We can imagine how much Jesus rejoiced when Adolf said, “I have seen my children happy because they are well fed.”

We saw Christ in El Salvador, in Sandra and Santos Amaya’s family. Like the body of Christ—which, though one body, has many members—each family member contributes their unique gifts to support the household. We saw Christ in Sandra’s sacrifices to ensure her family and community can thrive, from learning how to keep chickens to traveling long distances for training that helps her and her neighbors.

We saw Christ in Indonesia, through Evita and her disaster preparedness group. Together, they have helped keep their community safe during natural disasters, which have increased and become more destructive due to climate change. We saw Christ again in the group’s communal vegetable garden, which ensures their families have nutritious food even in emergencies.

Lastly, we have seen Christ in you during this holy season—in your prayers, sacrifices and almsgiving. As we near Holy Week, we reflect on the Eucharist as the sacrament of unity that ignites in us the desire to get out of our comfort zone and become Jesus’ hands to care for our neighbors. Let us continue to imitate Christ in how he offers himself for us on the Cross and in the Eucharist. In this way, may we generously give of ourselves to honor and uphold the dignity of our sisters and brothers around the world.

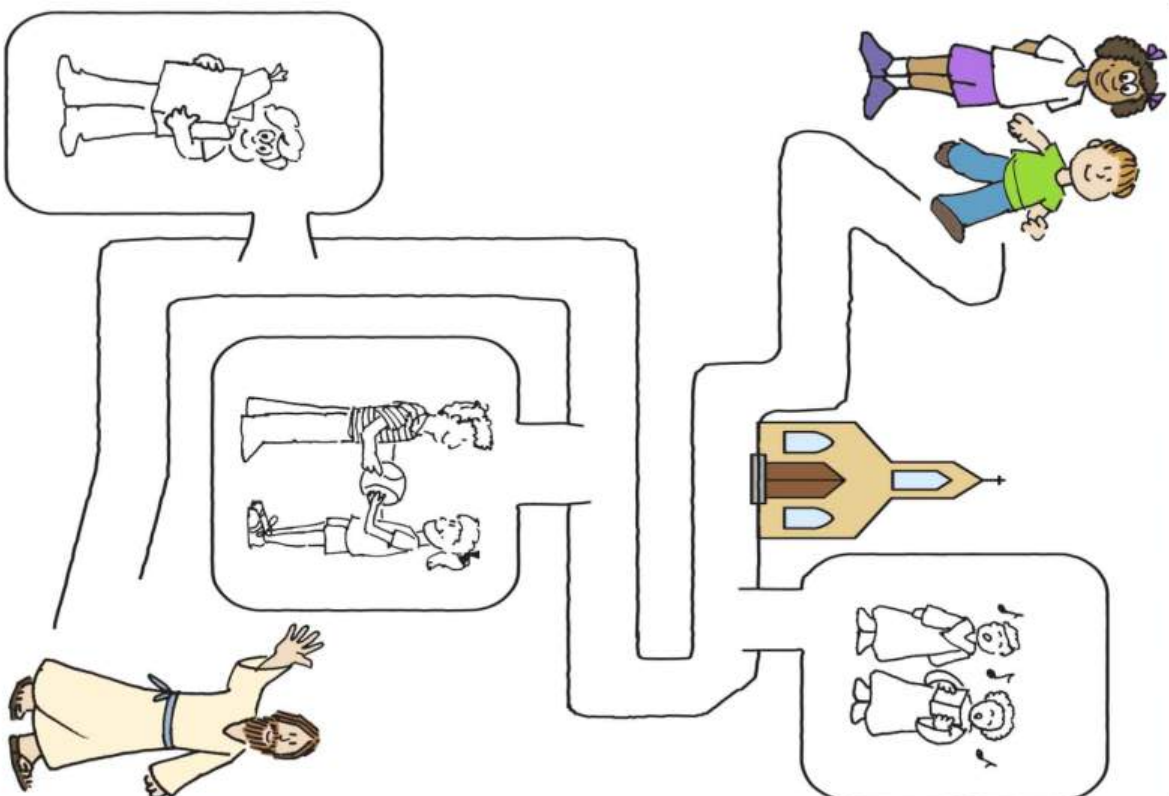
